A quarry is a place where rocks, sand or minerals are extracted from the surface of the Earth.

A quarry is a type of mine called an open-pit mine because it is open to the Earth's surface.

Why are there quarries in Clitheroe?

The rock under and around Clitheroe is Limestone with some clay
Limestone has been used for centuries to make Quick Lime that was
used for lime mortar for buildings such as
Clitheroe Castle
and to use as fertiliser on the clay soil.

There are many old disused limekilns in the area.

The limestone is now mostly used for cement.

Crushed rock is heated in the huge kiln to make Cement.

Cement is the main ingredient of concrete.

What is Limestone?

sedimentary rock
formed about 340 million years ago
this area was covered by warm shallow seas with marine life
Hard parts of animals and algae sank to sea bed
Calcium carbonate formed
Local limestone darkened by clay and carbon
Ideal for cement

What types of rock are there?

Sedimentary eg limestone, sandstone

Igneous eg basalt, granite

Metamorphic eg marble, hornfels, slate

Here are some pieces of limestone, slate, sandstone, granite, hornfels

Examine them

Describe what you see and feel

Write down the words you use

See if you can draw one
